Of course not. It takes a lot more to be a woman than the proper anatomy-I know. I've been practicing since I was a teenager.

I think I really began to learn about femininity during the 18 months I spent in Paris during the war. I felt immediately at

home in that lovely city. It was very much like my home, New Orleans. Except that I knew no one, and was free to live as I pleased when I was off duty. I lived as a woman.

One of the fellows I became friendly with was a young dress designer in a great French fashion house.

Many are the weekends I stayed at his home. And even his mother didn't wink an eye when she saw me dress in the beautiful clothes my friend whipped up for me.

Transvestitism

Neither my transvestitism nor my race troubled this Frenchman.

Once when I was wearing a gorgeous original gown by Pierre, he took me to Du Vals, one of the most elegant elubs in the gay capital.

I didn't notice when Pierre went to the bandstand to whisper something to the bandleader, but the next thing I knew I was in the spotlight. I did "C'est Si Bon" in

French, an uptempo version of "How High The Moon," and finished with a slow, sweet blues, "You Stay On My Mind." And when I was done, I got a standing ovation!

But my days in Europe were not all so gay and sophisticated. I went to see some other places at the end of the war, places where you couldn't help but think of race and persecution.

It is so easy to be black in Europe. Not that racial preju-dice is nonexistent on the continent, but there is nothing to compare with the South, or the black ghettos of Harlem and Chicago's south side.

Black In America

I have reflected long and hard about the Negro in American society, and I take a stand somewhere between the integrationists and the Black Muslims.

Unlike the Muslims, I do not believe that the Negroes should set up a separate state. On a social level, this would deprive both blacks and whites.

And on a personal level, I have too many white friends that I couldn't bear to be separated from.

I am an open minded person, and I have never made friends on the basis of anything but their worth to me as individual

human beings. Still, I don't think I would marry a white man. This would bring so many extra problems to an already diffi-cult relationship that it cult relationship, that it might ruin any love we felt

for each other. And though I cannot bear children-there's no operation that can make this possible yet —I might adopt some kids

someday. And adopted or natural, it's not easy to be the child of an interracial marriage.

You aren't accepted in either the Negro or white world.

Mixed Marriage

I know this is true, for I have

seen Negroes shun other Neg-roes who were "too light." So even if I adopted a dark child, he might be shunned by people of my race who thought his father was too light.

No, there are just too many needless complications that come out of mixed marriages. And these added burdens don't help a new marriage.

But I won't be getting married for a long time, no slr! I have made too many exciting changes in my life in the past year to tie myself down now.

The operation you know about. I've never been happier in my life than I am since I underwent surgery. In fact, I have just begun to really live.

Before now everything was dress rehearsal. Also I've given up my nurs-

ing career to try and make it in the career I've always wanted, show business.

I'm a singer, very much like the late Dinah Washington, they tell me. And I'm going to make it as or bust.

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
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I got the courage to leave my position in the hospital shortly after my sex change operations were declared a total success. It seemed a perfect time to make a completely new start.

And now, to light up the last bit of dark on the stage, I've told my story, nationally, in The National Insider.

Everyone will read about me, think about me for awhile, and eventually forget that I wasn't born a woman.

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
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
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
