In April of 1997 I posted a little web site. You all know I'm involved with newcomers, and the number of them that have found us over the internet prompted me to investigate the possibilities of creating a site of my own. (<http://www.mcs.net/~mandy>) The purpose was to have an internet presence that helped define mainstream CD's (as characterized by most of our membership) to the public.

I had surfed the net and come up with enough sites that displayed crossdressing in despicable ways. Some with nudity, others with fetishes, some very amateur in presentation and some with gross inaccuracies in what they had to say. Everybody has the right to their own presentation, but what I had found wasn't what I felt the majority of Tri-Ess girls would want to be categorized as. I saw many crossdressers with dismal poses, as if they were sad about their disposition. I wanted a site that expressed the joy of crossdressing and all my photos would have to relate that.

I worried about security, but most of you who have seen my male side have said that my female appearance is nothing like the male view. So I trusted in your comments, checked out technical security issues to keep hackers from finding out my true identity and went ahead with it. So far, so good. I have not had anyone come up to me and ask me if the girl they saw on the net was really me...yet!

So I scanned some favorite photos, worked up some text and posted a budget site that costs me just \$10 a month to maintain. Well it was a slow start. I was the only one surfing to it for the first few weeks. Then I e-mailed a few other CD's and asked them to link to my site. Little by little the number of visitors grew. One fine day I actually got 10 hits! Now, a little over two years later, I get nearly 3000 different people scoring well over 20,000 page hits every month. The site ranks 47th in hits to all transgendered pages, according to one agency that freely informed me of this fact. These numbers tell me that there are a lot more people out there looking at crossdressers than we might expect. The closet must be pretty big, but the internet is helping open the door. How can we get some of these folk to join us and enjoy being with others like themselves, in person and not in cyber space?

I have received hundreds of e-mails from persons who ask questions about themselves and their crossdressing. I reply to every decent mail. Some write back, maybe only once. With a few I have carried on some long-term discussions. Some even include their real names and are surprised when I tell them to be more cautious. Mail from wives asking for advice comes this way too, but not often. I rarely get sexual or derogatory mail. There have been a few, but nothing that alarmed me. There's a delete option that such mail gets as soon as I read it.

Many people read what I call 'Short Shorts', a collection of a



couple hundred brief TG experiences that others have related to me, or that I have personally had. Some are funny, some serious and a few are definitely tear jerkers. There are high hit counts on the photo pages. (If only Photoshop could come out with a line of makeup that could match what can be done digitally!) However, most people fall victim to a link that I labeled "Sex, Sex, Sex". Hey! How else are you going to get attention? It's actually a biological explanation of the different path a fetus takes in regards to sex and gender from conception to birth. Sorry to all those who were looking for a good time.

Maintaining the site is sometimes a chore, since I have to keep coming up with new material, and of course the obligatory pictures of me in a new outfit or pose. Oh vanity! I'm glad I went to a digital camera. I have saved hundreds in processing costs! Just need a bigger disk drive now.

There are a lot of others out there now that have posted decent sites. My current goal is to seek them out and create a page of links to those most like us. People who lead decent lives and just love to spend some time as a lady.

Hi everybody!! Remember me? Sorry I haven't written for a while, but with Terri's surgery, recovery, and related stuff, Abby hasn't been able to get out much. Anyway, last month Abby did get the chance to get out on the road (finally!!) under somewhat unusual circumstances.

Every summer, Terri and I have to attend a 3-day conference in Michigan. After eleven straight years of attendance, we decided that we could blow off all the Saturday activities and have an ABBY AND TERRI PLAY TOURIST DAY. Terri is a lighthouse fan and collector, so we decided to drive over to Lake Michigan to visit and photograph lighthouses.

Our first task was to create Abby. The conference was held at a college in central Michigan, so we had to leave and make the transformation while driving to our first lighthouse in Muskegon. It's really hard getting dressed and made up in a moving car, what with all the traffic, bumps, and confining spaces. The finishing touches were put on when we stopped in the parking lot of a factory than was closed for the weekend. It was going to be a sunny but cool summer day with temperatures in the low 70s. Playing tourist as Abby and Terri was an interesting and exciting experience. Hopefully, we'll do it again, soon.

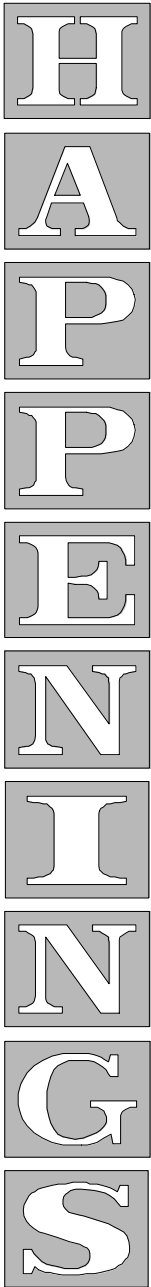
