

GENERAL INFORMATION

About this Supplement: This Program Supplement is a handy digest of essential information about the Conference including locations of events, changes in the Program, the Silent Auction catalog, and other pertinent information. Suggested Use: The Program, distributed earlier, describes all of the events of the Conference. Use it to determine your choices for each multiple-event time period. The events, time and location information in this Supplement is arranged in an order that closely follows the information in the Program. Mark your preferences in the Supplement and use it to guide you through the Conference.

About AHP Conferences: If this is your first time at an AHP Conference, a word is in order about the nature of these events. Like the organization itself, the Conference offers a unique opportunity to both give and take. You will be able to get new information, experiences and ideas about personal and professional issues. You will meet new friends, and there will be networking, inspiration and entertainment. GUIDELINES FOR ENJOYING THE CONFERENCE:

- 1. No pre-registration for specific events is required. Attendance is on a first-come basis. Arrive early to events that are particularly important to you to be assured of a space. Have a second and third choice in mind for all multiple-event time periods.
- 2. Your nametag is your admission ticket to all events. Monitors will be at the door of all events to check for nametags and to assist you with any problems or questions. You will not be admitted without a nametag.
- 3. Please arrive on time for each event. If you arrive late, enter an event only if it will not interrupt the activities

already begun, or at the invitation of the monitor.

- 4. There are **five basic program formats**. Plenary events are described on pages 9-11 of the Program; Community Theme Sessions and the Field Activities Meeting, pages 14-15; afternoon workshops, conversations and the Forum, pages 16-31; Evening special events, pages 9-11; and other events such as films, art show and luncheon meetings, page 33.
- 5. Tapes will be made and instantly available of some of the major addresses and workshops. Single tapes will sell for \$6 plus tax or you can purchase a set of four tapes for \$22. Go to the Hospitality Center for complete information and purchases. Taping is by Bookshelf Tapes.
- 6. The central gathering place will be Ackerman, also known as the Student Union. Four locations will be of particular interest:

The Hospitality Center. Ackerman third floor lounge; hours: 10 am-10 pm. Here you can meet people, post or pick up messages from the Message Board, share travel information on the Travel Board, and find out last minute Program changes. You can also find general information about baby-sitting and child care, housing and restaurants.

The Hospitality Center features:

• The AHP Membership and Journal Table. Come and find out more about the Association for Humanistic Psychology. Watch a slide-tape show; talk to Board members, Field Activities representatives, chapter members and others when enjoy membership in AHP. AHP's year-long planning project has produced a strange combination of diffuse data and minimal response. Rather than seeing this as a problem to be solved by different survey techniques and more pressure on the membership, we propose to reflect on these findings themselves and to invite interested members to explore together what purposes, policies and procedures are appropriate to a physically dispersed and various membership organization like AHP. Presuming that these discussions will carry us beyond the two-hour time limit of the schedule, we will have space set aside for the discussion to continue the next morning. This meeting and its follow-up will be facilitated by a person outside the organization and, after a stage-setting review of the planning process, will be open to whatever directions the participating members wish to give it.






