

### Army Surgeon, Was a Woman.

"Murray Hall's" case has brought to mind the case of "Dr. James Barry," once Inspector general of hospitals in the British army and a "C. B." This individual presented the appearance of a slightly built, dark-complexioned man, beardless and with abrupt manners. The doctor had a marked impatience with anything like contradiction, and his temper led to several duels, in which he came off best.
