By the time this is printed, many tens of thousands will have gathered in New York City for the June 1994 extravaganza known as Stonewall 25, the celebration to mark the anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion that was the watershed of modern Gay liberation. Empress Nicole Ramirez Murray wanted you to know that the interests of drag queens, transgenders, transsexuals. bigenders. crossgenders, androgynes, femmiphiles, transvestites, she-males, female impersonators, street queens, cross-dressers and other divas were represented by her presence as one of the National Co-Chairpersons of the event, Empress Nicole, also known as Nicole Ramirez Murray, is not just your ordinary drag queen. Nicole is the only person to have been elected to the National Executive Boards

of both the 1987 and 1993 March on Washington, was the Chairperson of the Mayor of San Diego's first Gay/Lesbian Advisory Board, is a past National Executive Board Member of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (H.R.C.F.), and is a well-known, successful fund raiser and female impersonator. With a Latino heritage, Nicole was recently honored with the first annual Cesar E. Chavez Social Justice Award for over twenty years of hard work, dedication, and activism within two minority communities - the Latino Community and the Lesbian and Gay Community. To top it all off, the International Stonewall Ball was her personal brain child. The ball was hailed as "a global drag extravaganza." One of the other functions of the ball was to recognize twenty-five members of the drag/transgender community for making a difference and an impact on societal issues relating to the Lesbian and Gay community - locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally. "To celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots and try to ignore the important role drag queens played is like celebrating Thanksgiving and not mentioning Native

Americans," stated Nicole. "Stonewall 25 gives us the golden opportunity to educate a whole new generation about the history of our movement and the important role drag queens, bull dykes, and people of color played at the Stonewall Riots. "It is important to remember that lesbians and gays of different backgrounds and lifestyles were brought together 25 years ago because of the riots, and are coming together again to celebrate today in honor of that event. Stonewall 25 truly belongs to all of us."
